Research


- The research should make a strong argument that the external environment and the "return of geopolitics" in Western Balkans are a major difference to the earlier Eastern enlargement of the EU.
- The accession process of the Western Balkan countries were very slow and will be long and uncertain in future.
- From other side presence of the China in the Western Balkan has become increasingly visible, specially try infrastructure investments.



Do the Western Balkan counties have strategy for the next five-ten years?

- The Centre activities will provide synergy trans-institutional, transnational expertize, that would provide strategic response elevating the regional views, for the political makers to have strategic response to it.
