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- □ The Trans European Policy Studies Association (TEPSA) is the first trans European research network in the field of European affairs. Founded in 1974, it consists of 47 leading research institutes throughout Europe.
- □ TEPSA's aim is to provide **high quality research** on European integration based on a '**Triple**A' approach: Analysis, Assessment, and Advice in order to stimulate discussion on policies and political options for Europe.
- □ TEPSA and its member institutes have engaged in a two-fold approach providing expertise on EU policies and politics combined with a vast experience in organising and conducting EU-wide research, training and networks.
- □ It has a **Board** composed of leading European academics and a **Secretariat** based in Brussels.



# TEPSA's projects (I)



InDivEU brings together some of Europe's foremost research universities and outstanding scholars of **Differentiated**Integration with the aim to create a knowledge base on DI for Europe's policy makers.



Differentiation: Clustering Excellen ce (DiCE) main objective is to ensure that state-of-the-art research on differentiation is translated into policy advice and made accessible to policymakers at European, national and regional levels.



EP4U aims at raising citizens' awareness of EU policy-making and engage in discussions about the work of the EU and the EP in four policy areas:

- climate & environment;
- employment & social policies;
- migration & asylum;
- non-discrimination and protection of fundamental rights.



# TEPSA's projects (II)



TEPSA is beneficiary of an Operating Grant within the Europe for Citizens programme, aimed at making the EU more accessible to citizens and at strengthening their civic engagement.



TEPSA cooperates with the European Parliament in providing external expertise in the form of studies and presentations to several EP committees in the field of EU external relations.



## Pre-Presidency Conferences (PPC)

☐ TEPSA's flagship activity, taking place twice a year in the capital of the country holding the Presidency of the Council of the EU.



- They bring together academics and researchers from the broad TEPSA network with policy-makers, media and civil society to discuss the agenda and challenges of the upcoming Council Presidencies.
- Researchers from the TEPSA network formulate **recommendations** to be presented to **high-level officials** of the government concerned in a plenary session.



#### **EU@Work Seminars**



- ☐ They take place **once or twice a year** in Brussels (or online)
- One thematic seminar on a specific EU policy for **Master students and graduates** and one general seminar on EU affairs for **undergraduate students**.
- □ They combine academic lectures with visits to EU institutions and NGOs and meetings with practitioners.
- □ Funded by the Europe for Citizens programme, they offer students and young professionals the chance to gain first-hand insights from researchers, EU practitioners and policymakers on key issues of European affairs.



- **TEPSA Explainers**: short videos where TEPSA experts discuss salient topics of European and national politics and policies;
- **TEPSA Briefs**: policy briefs written by TEPSA experts.

TEPSA Student Papers: papers written by winners of the TEPSA student contests






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Project Life Cycle – PDCA approach





The project is delivering the anticipated benefits and is being well managed


Efficiency measures the outputs – qualitative and quantitative – in relation to the inputs

The positive and negative changes produced directly or indirectly, intended or unintended

Sustainability is concerned with measuring whether the benefits of an activity are likely to continue after donor funding has been withdrawn
